


Results of Our Spring Survey for the 2024-2025 Academic Year

In April of this year, we emailed a survey to the 12,876 students and faculty receiving free GlobalPost subscriptions through our Global Education Initiative. These subscribers represent more than 1,400 schools across the U.S. and more than **100 other countries**.

Thirty-five percent of respondents read GlobalPost daily, and an additional 27% read it three or more times each week, an exceptionally strong result especially for this age group.

Below you will see the major findings of the survey and a selection of the hundreds of open-ended comments we received from students and faculty.


Our Global Education Initiative has expanded enormously, now with students reading GlobalPost in more than 100 countries, spanning every region of the world. We are especially proud of our strong presence in the Global South.



Survey Findings


How often do you read GlobalPost on average each week?

More than 35% of respondents report they read GlobalPost daily, while more than 27% read it three or more times each week. Overall, 84% read the newsletter at least twice a week.



To what degree has reading GlobalPost increased your knowledge of the world?

Of the responses, 100% of readers say that GlobalPost has increased their knowledge of the world, with roughly 57% of respondents saying that GlobalPost has significantly increased their knowledge of the world, and more than 34% say it has somewhat increased their knowledge of the world.




Before you started reading GlobalPost, did you follow global news?

- Nearly 40% of respondents indicated that they follow global news more closely now that they read GlobalPost.
- 32% say they read approximately the same amount of world news as before subscribing to GlobalPost.
- 28% said they read very little world news before they subscribed to GlobalPost.

On a scale of 1-5, with 5 being the most important and 1 being the least important, where does GlobalPost rate as your go-to source for world news.

Nearly 60% of respondents say that GlobalPost is their top or near top go-to-source for global news.




Nearly 60% say GlobalPost is their top or second choice source for world news.

Roughly 95% of respondents say that GlobalPost presents news in a nonpartisan manner.


How did you learn about GlobalPost?

Most respondents learned about GlobalPost from their respective schools.




Which of the following opportunities would you like to see included in the GlobalPost newsletter?
